Lake District Update

Winter Dredging Successes and Challenges

This winter marked another successful season of dredging, with some significant progress and a few projects still to finish.

Eagle's Nest Trap

The long-awaited Eagle's Nest Trap was finally completed. This trap will provide protection for both the Rookery and the Skid Row Boat Landing. The contractor, Krueger Steinfest, encountered challenging conditions, but managed to remove the planned 10,000 cubic yards of sediment to complete the trap.





Muskrat Creek

Another bucket-list project came together this winter as well. We opened the mouth of Muskrat Creek, which will allow boating access for the first time in many years. The Skid Steer Guy removed 3,500 cubic yards of sand from the mouth of the creek. This project was funded by The Friends of Lake Eau Claire.



Skid Row Trap

The Skid Steer Guy also cleaned out the trap above the Skid Row Boat Landing for the second time, removing 15,000 cubic yards of sediment. This will help maintain and improve navigation below the trap. We're exploring options for a new route to access the Skid Row Trap without using the boat landing in the future.



Hay Creek

The west side delta of Hay Creek remains unfinished due to permit time constraints. Despite this, the project is slated for completion next winter to improve lake access for the homes in this area.

Results

The dredging efforts are showing big improvements in the lake and river. Bathymetric mapping shows deeper channels with rocky bottoms upstream, which helps with navigation and fish spawning. If you want to see the work, drive around to our deposit sites and imagine those piles of sand in our lake!

Lake Eau Claire Panfish Regulation Change

The experimental panfish regulation on Lake Eau Claire is set to expire in 2026, and a new regulation will take its place. The experimental panfish regulation currently on Lake Eau Claire is a 25 aggregate bag limit, but only 10 can be of one species. This regulation was put in place in 2016 as part of a larger statewide study to determine a more effective panfish regulation to be used as an option on a statewide scale. There were over 100 lakes in the study, and some had the same regulation as Lake Eau Claire, while others had a 15 fish bag limit with only 5 of one species, and other lakes had reduced bag limits during May and June. The goal of study was to move forward with only one of these three experimental regulations based on improvements in panfish populations. The experimental regulation that showed the most promise was the 5 of one species and 15 panfish aggregate limit, so continuing on with the current regulation on Lake Eau Claire is not an option.

The current experimental panfish regulation on Lake Eau Claire showed promise with modest increases in yellow perch and black crappie size structure, but it will no longer be an option after 2025. If nothing is done, the panfish regulation on Lake Eau Claire will revert back to a 25 fish aggregate limit, which was the bag limit prior to 2016. However, there is another regulation in our panfish management 'toolbox' of a bag limit of 10 panfish in aggregate. This option is the closest option to the current experimental regulation on Lake Eau Claire although a bit more conservative and the same regulation that is on Lake Altoona. The 10 panfish in aggregate regulation is proposed to move forward on Lake Eau Claire for the 2026 fishing season and beyond depending on the statewide Spring Hearings voting results. Last year, I reached out to the Lake District to gauge local support for this new regulation, and it received a lot of positive feedback. You can vote on whether you want this proposed regulation to move forward at this year's Spring Hearings which are on April 14th in each county around the state. You can attend in person or vote online from April 14th-16th. The Lake Eau Claire panfish regulation question is number 40, and it is nested in with other waterbodies proposed to go to the same regulation. 	Fish	Season	Regulation
	Bullheads	Open All Year	No minimum length limit and the daily bag limit is unlimited.
	Catfish	Open All Year	No minimum length limit and the daily bag limit is 10.
	Largemouth Bass & Smallmouth Bass	May 3, 2025 to March 1, 2026	The minimum length limit is 14" and the daily bag limit is 5.
	Muskellunge	May 24, 2025 to December 31, 2025	The minimum length limit is 40" and the daily bag limit is 1.
	Northern Pike	May 3, 2025 to March 1, 2026	No minimum length limit and the daily bag limit is 5.
	Panfish	Open All Year	No minimum length limit and the daily bag limit is 25, 25 panfish may be kept, but only 10 of any one species.
	Walleye	May 3, 2025 to March 1, 2026	The minimum length is 15", but walleye, sauger, and hybrids from 20" to 24" may not be kept, and only 1 fish over 24" is allowed. The daily bag limit is 3.

EAU CLAIRE RIVER WATERSHED ASSOCIATION (ECRWA) 2025 SPRING ACTIVITES By Joe Kirst and Rod Zika

Greetings from ECRWA (ECRWA.org)! For those of you who are unfamiliar with our association, we operate as a 501c3 with the mission of helping the Lake districts and other organizations throughout the 900 square mile Eau Claire River watershed. We work in concert with the Eau Claire River Watershed Coalition (eauclaireriverwatershed.org). We consider ourselves the "technical" arm of the watershed.



RECENT ECRWA ACTIVITIES

- Mike Lea and Joe Kirst flew our drone over the five sand spoil sites both pre and post dredging activities. The five sites are:
 - Lake Altoona:
 - Peaceful Canoe Landing
 - Lake Eau Claire:
 - Skid Row
 - Gravel Pit
 - Hwy G
 - Muskrat Creek
- The drone flights help determine the volume of sand dredged. The districts use these values to render payment to the contractors.
- Mike and Joe Kirst spent the afternoon of March 12th bathymetrically surveying Skid row up to the new Eagle's nest dredge sites. Drone photos were also taken of the areas to record the changes now and into the future.
- Rod Zika is working with Larry Koschak and Phil Strand from Mead Lake on their plans to improve the lake's
 water quality by adding an aeration system similar to Lake Eau Claire's. This could provide a significant
 improvement in water quality in downstream Lakes Eau Claire and Altoona.
- Fred Poss and Joe Kirst spent last Saturday morning at the Stanley Youth Expo. Fred showed the kids pictures of LECs fish habitat drops. They then practiced their underhand toss with rod and reel. Joe chatted with them about Storm Water and strategies to lessen pollution in storm water. Check out Rain to River (raintorivers.org). The Stanley Sportsman Club, who is a voting member of ECRWA, sponsors this annual event.
- Another part of ECRWA is involved in fish stocking and habitat efforts throughout the watershed. A general
 meeting is planned for early this summer to address issues like fish crib design, location and evaluation of
 performance over time. This will concentrate on Lake Eau Claire where we have the most data, but the
 information should be relevant to all water bodies in the watershed.
- ECRWA is working with numerous organizations to develop a comprehensive plan to measure water amounts and pollutant quantities transported from the various regions of the watershed. Six regions are identified in the plan. When fully operational they will report real-time water flows, temperatures, and various properties like sediment, chlorophyll, nutrients, etc.

The remainder of the spring and early summer will prove busy for ECRWA and its numerous partner organizations and volunteers, without whom we would accomplish little.
