# Fish Crib Installations Resume

Recently, David Claude and Fred Poss organized the restart of fish crib installations. The most recent crib building and installation date was held Saturday, June 22<sup>nd</sup> at the north side boat landing. We had 12 total volunteers that helped make it a successful event:

- > Thanks to Joe Vydrzal for his efforts to connect two pontoons together and pilot the craft around the lake.

- > Thanks to Joe Bechtel for running the skid steer to load the cribs onto the pontoon.
- > Thanks to Rod Zika and Joe Kirst for their GPS work to identify the crib locations.
- ➤ Thank you to Matt Solie, Duane Ives, and Nate Smith for their muscle and assistance on and off the water.
- Thank you to Cathy Lea and Cheryl Claude for preparing lunch and drinks for the work crew!

Eight deep water cribs and six shallow water cribs were installed. The deep-water cribs went in the deep west end of the lake. The shallow cribs were installed around mid-lake islands.

Another installation event is planned for Saturday, September 14th at the North boat landing at 8:30 am. Planned to install are four deep water cribs and eight shallow water cribs. Needed are men or women or teens who are strong enough to help push cribs off the pontoon barge. Bring a hammer, work boots, gloves and a life jacket. You will be asked to sign a volunteer waiver that morning. If you are interested in having one or two shallow water fish cribs dropped out in front of your lake property,

To receive an electronic application to receive one or two fish cribs or tree drops, or to volunteer to help work, please comcast.net one week before the next installation date.

Why do we do this, you might ask. Our lake lacks natural weeds, rock, and wood that create spawning and protection areas for fish. The cribs that we installed beginning in 2012 are now deteriorating and need replacement.

#### Lake District Update

#### **Healthier Alternatives to Shoreline Rip Rap and Hardscapes**

Increased boat traffic on Lake Eau Claire can lead to more issues with shoreline erosion. It can be alarming to see shoreline being washed away and is understandable that a homeowner would want to stop the damage as quickly as possible. One common method is adding a layer of rocks to the shoreline, called rip rap. If done properly, it may help protect the shoreline from the pounding of waves. However, this technique has definite drawbacks to Lake Eau Claire.

#### **Less Than Ideal Rip Rap**

Rocks placed in the area where shoreline meets the water <u>do</u> <u>not filter runoff</u> coming from the landscape the way natural vegetation does. Removing native plants to install rip rap can lead to more erosion. Sand and soil, fertilizers, or other contaminants are washed directly into the lake through rocks. This runoff contributes to sedimentation and algae blooms. Rip rap also does not provide habitat for fish that natural vegetation



does. Plants hanging over the water give fish the shady, protected cover that is needed, and keeps the water cooler. <u>Rocks transfer the sun's heat to the water</u>, forcing fish out of these areas. Taller native grasses and shrubs also have the added benefit of deterring geese from coming onto shore.

A better option to preserve Lake Eau Claire shoreline is utilizing natural plantings. Leaving natural vegetation is optimal. If a low-hanging tree is getting too close to the water, you can reach out and we will cable it in as a tree- drop in the fall. Avoid mowing or cutting vegetation from steep banks or down to the water and leave as large of a buffer as possible. Even a 10-foot-wide strip is helpful. Minimize the width of your access point. Open grate stairs and docks help vegetation continue to thrive and keeps shorelines in place, even in high water and under extreme conditions.

The Healthy Lakes Program offers a grant to landowners who need help replacing, repairing, or restoring shorelines. They offer a grant through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) that helps cover the costs for landowners to establish natural plantings along their shorelines. Up to \$1000 is available to develop and implement a plan for stabilizing the bank. Grant applications are due November 15 of each year and are managed through the Eau Claire DNR office. If you have already installed rip rap on your shoreline, there are suggestions for making the most of this option. These include ensuring that proper geotextile (landscaping fabric) is installed prior to adding rock (if more is planned). Allow vegetation to grow between the rocks and do not trim back or harm plants naturally growing from the rocky areas. Avoid using fertilizers and pesticides in this area. Minimize direct runoff from your yard.





#### **Nature Notes**

Common Water Snake

Had an interesting encounter a couple of weeks ago while fishing off my pontoon on a nice July evening. I went to the back of the boat to cast a different area when I noticed a large, muscular snake lying on the deck of the boat, just behind the back door. It was a common water snake; *Nerodia sipedon*. They are fairly common in the Eau Claire River system and its lakes, often seen swimming, sunning on a log or dock, even sometimes up on a tree branch. This specimen was about 30 inches, dark brownish gray with black crossbands and some red showing on the underside. I took a paddle and gently nudged him off the deck and he promptly swam to shore. This snake has been hanging around my dock and shoreline, and my new neighbor has seen him (or her) sunning on his dock a couple of times. Like me, he is okay with snakes, and actually tossed a small perch to the snake, which the snake quickly snapped up and swallowed whole.

Unfortunately, these snakes are often killed when encountered, as people sometimes think they've encountered a water moccasin. There are no water moccasins in Wisconsin; they are restricted to states further south. Of the 21 species of snakes found in Wisconsin, only two are venomous; those both being rattlesnakes; the timber rattler and the massasauga rattlesnake. I have handled water snakes but generally give them their distance. They do bite when agitated and have teeth which can cause a painful bite. They also may excrete a powerful, foul musk as a way of discouraging predators, which include large fish, birds, skunks, raccoons, foxes, otters, and others. People exhibiting Ophidiophobia (fear of snakes), often needlessly kill them as well.

Water snakes feed primarily on fish, crayfish, and amphibians. They play a role in helping maintain a balance in lake and river ecosystems. They breed in April or May and give birth to live young between August and October. Each female may give birth to anywhere from 5 - 60 young, depending on her size. Mortality is high for the young, but a few individuals have been found to live over 10 years. A large adult may reach over 40 inches in length. Being cold blooded, these critters find a spot on land like a crevice or animal burrow to spend the winter. They brumate, which is a condition similar to but not as physiologically profound as hibernation. This is often done communally with other members of their own kind or reptiles of other species.

About a week or so after my first encounter, I had my daughter and grandkids out for a trip up the river. As we prepared to stop for a little swim, my daughter went to the back of the boat and suddenly yelled SNAKE!! Sure enough, there was Ed. (I had named him in an attempt to make him less threatening to the girls). He looked like the same snake I had seen before, laying in exactly the same spot he had the first time. He apparently liked that spot and had just hitched a ride. After making sure everyone had a good look at him, I again nudged him off the boat and into the water and he calmly swam away. I am curious to see whether he can navigate his way back down the lake and come back home. Happy wildlife watching!!
